

# How To Repair Small Holes in Window Screen

If you think the preceding recipe was novel, you haven't seen anything vet. Try this one for smaller holes and tears.

#### Utensils

Ice pick or awl

## Ingredients

Clear nail polish

### **Approximate Time: 5 To 15 Minutes**




Figure 46. **Patching Small Holes** in a Window Screen

- 1. Straighten strands of torn area with ice pick or awl (Fig. 46A).
- 2. Apply a dab of nail polish over the small hole (Fig. 46B).
- Let drv.
- 4. Repeat application several times, allowing each coat to dry until hole is too small for an insect to penetrate.

## How To Repair Small Tears in Window Screen

And here is the piece de-resistance. It combines techniques established in the two preceding recipes and should be used on medium-sized holes or tears in screening.

#### **Utensils**

Ice pick or awl

## Ingredients

Long strand of nylon thread or fishing line Clear nail polish

### **Approximate Time: 5 To 15 Minutes**




Figure 47. Patching a Torn Window Screen

- 1. Smooth out torn area with ice pick or awl (Fig. 47A).
- 2. Darn the area to be repaired in rotating fashion as shown in Figure 47B.
- 3. Pull stitches snugly but not tightly.
- 4. Once hole or tear is completely stitched, apply nail polish to sewn area (Fig. 47C).
- 5. Let dry.
- 6. Repeat application of nail polish to insure adhesion.
